The night started out much like the 2008 Lee-Jackson Banquet, cold and rainy. The bad weather never broke our spirits though and the banquet was another successful event for the Camp. Prior to the dinner, we were treated to private tours of the Washington Light Infantry Relic room. The tours of the WLI relic room were a great honor as this room is rarely opened for public viewing. We were able to view war relics from the Revolutionary Period on up to the Iraq War and it was also a reminder of the great sacrifices our country has made throughout its history. After the tours, we adjourned to the Banquet room for dinner featuring Prime Rib. The food was very good and prepared by students from the College of Charleston. The decadent desserts had us all packing on a pound or two just from looking at them! Once dinner was finished, we listened to our scheduled speaker, Dr. Eric Emerson. Dr. Emerson spoke about a side of Robert E. Lee's life most of us never hear about— his personal life. Most stories about the great Marse Robert are those of the great military tactician and superb leader of men. Dr. Emerson's speech centered on Lee the family man and the deep devotion to his children. Though Lee's duties throughout his military career kept him away from home much of the time, Lee was a man of letters and those remaining documents sent home are a testament to his love of family. Dr. Emerson's speech definitely conveyed a more human side of Lee, in spite of the lofty position (practically Sainthood) he holds in the hearts of those with Southern heritage. 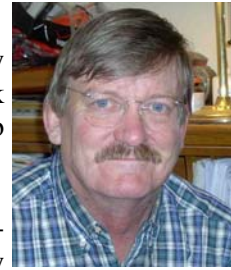

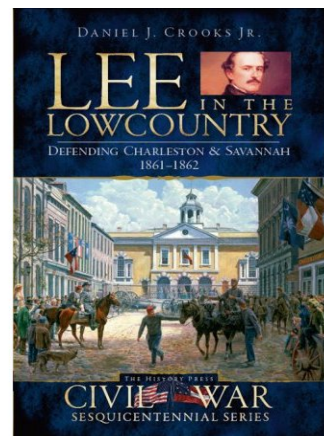
Secession Camp Welcomes New Members

Lee's months in Charleston, SC during the early part of the War. General Lee set up the coastal defenses in the Lowcountry from Charleston, SC to Savannah, Ga. Mr. Crooks resides in the low country.

- SCV Charge was given by 1st Lt Commander John Genes
 - Invocation given by Gene Patrick
 - Salute to the Flags given by Color Sgt. Loren O'Donnell.
 - The cooks were then recognized for the meal. Mess Corporal Don Pace was assisted by Perry Patrick, Robert Dandridge, Don Petty, Walter Canady, Danny Pinson and Bill Helms.
 - Introduction of guest.
 - The scheduled speaker Mike Coker was unable to attend. Our old reliable stand-by and camp member, Rick Hatcher showed moving pictures of several past Confederate Veteran Reunions including Mobile and Memphis. Also, a combined reunion of the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg survivors which took place at the high water mark wall. There were several parades, interviews, and burial ceremonies of veterans. Past Union and Confederate Generals were also shown in Cuba during the Spanish-American War. Rick narrated and added color comments during the film. Rick received an ovation for his presentation.
 - Treasurer's budget report for 2009 estimate was given by the Buck Perry. Income from dues, etcher, and quarter master is projected to be \$5,505.00 and expenses total \$4777.35. In December, the beginning balance was \$20,627.46 less checks to the Post & Courier, Friends of the Hunley, SCV International, S.C. 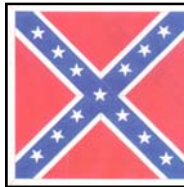

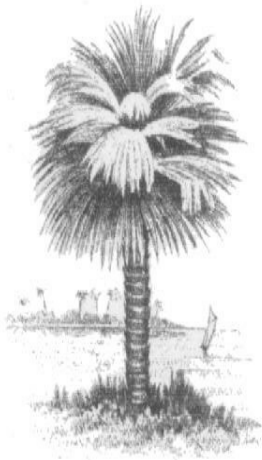
